  - A: **2** ohms
- 31. Given that the resistors are connected in parallel, what is the current drawn from the battery in amperes?
  - A: **9** amperes
- 32. What would the current drawn from the battery be, in amperes, if the resistors were instead connected in series?
  - A: **2** amperes
- 33. If the resistors are connected in series, what is the power output of the battery in watts, assuming 100% efficiency?
  - A: **36** watts

- 34. What mountain range contains Nanga Parbat, the world's second-most prominent mountain, as well as 8 of the other 10 highest mountains in the world?
